


Workforce Size in Powell County


Top Employing Industries, 2023

Populations Increasing


Powell County had **300 more people move in** than out since 2020, **4%** of the population.

Net Migration as a Percent of





Most People Not Working are Retired


Reasons Not Participating in Montana Labor Force
